I blame this all on Lydia. She had a good thing going--a sweet little hole in the fence that she could slip through. And I'm sure Becca saw her do it. But the hole wasn't Becca sized. But clearly the cat could get through, so to Becca's way of thinking, so could she.

Several broken fence slats later, Becca had her a hole. But it wasn't Cassidy sized. Yet.

That was last week. To briefly recap, as of last Friday, the Becca hole was barricaded with 2 shovels, a bucket holding a coil of fencing wire which was clipped to a metal dog kennel gate which was wedged into the hole in the fence. I thought I had MacGyvered a good enough temporary obstruction in front of the hole designed to deter Becca from worming her way out of the fence. And if you remember, I told you not to take any bets.

By Saturday, Becca had figured it out. So on Sunday, I hauled a wooden pallet (about 4 foot by 4 foot) over to the fence hole and leaned it against the fence and the garage. My mistake: Putting it on the outside of the fence.

Sunday night night I got home, the pallet was pushed slightly away from the fence and Becca was loose.

So Monday, I got smarter. I firmly wedged the pallet between the fence posts and the garage. I repositioned the metal gate with the bucket with the coil of wire inside attached, and stuck the shovels back through the hole. Notice that I used the word "firmly."

I know what you're thinking. This would all be solved if I just nailed a board across the hole. But that would be getting ahead of the story. And besides, doing something like that means I have to find a hammer, nails & board. It's easier to just drag stuff that's just sitting around doing nothing and hope it works.

Monday night both dogs got loose. They were quite impressed with themselves, of course. Cassidy has now figured it out.

So Tuesday I haul a second pallet and brace it on the inside of the fence. The dogs can't push that one out of the way. Silly me.

But I am smart enough to have my doubts. So mid afternoon, I return home, just to double check on the dogs, and yup, both are sitting in the driveway sunning themselves. So I reposition the pallets, pull down the driveway and turn off the engine. And wait. Within 5 minutes, Cassidy comes snaking through the fence.

You've got to realize, there really isn't a hole any more. But Aussies being Aussies, if they know they can get through, they will.

This time I wire the pallets together, using the fencing wire that was being used as ballast in the bucket. And if you remember the weather on Tuesday: cold & windy. And I can't find any gloves, although I finally found one glove after I gave up on the fencing wire because my hands were too cold to twist the wire where I needed it to go.

And it worked.

And then I made the mistake of putting the dogs in the front yard. Becca got out, over the low end of the fence where there still is a very very small snow drift. So I tied an old Christmas tree stump, with two branches sticking out like antlers, to the inside of the part of the fence she goes over.

I haven't yet had a chance to test this contraption. I'll keep you posted.

But I will report that the hole is now fixed thanks to a friend who came over & did what I should have tried in the first place. Board, nails & screws & a hammer.

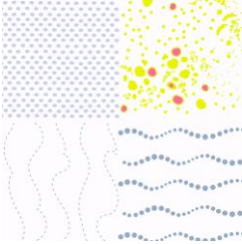
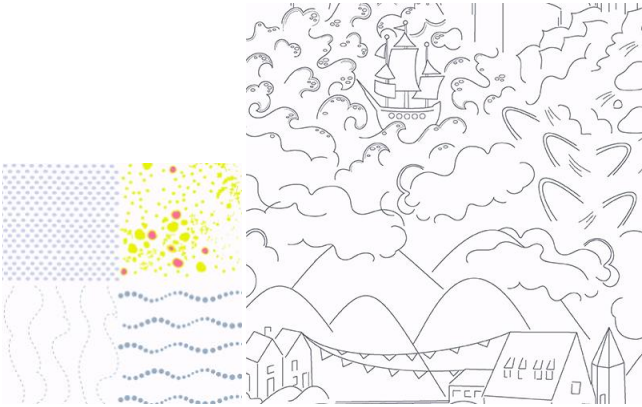

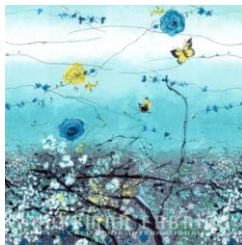

Kits for the entire project (minus binding & backing) are \$93. Individual patterns, kitted with fabric, are \$20.

NEW TIME

Machine Applied Binding

This style of binding uses cording to help keep the binding straight & true. Bring a small quilt, your binding and your sewing machine-check the supply list to make sure you have the right tools (cording, the correct foot, binding cut at the correct width). Putting binding on by machine cuts your time more than in half-and by using cording, you can have a perfectly applied binding with no messy "oops" where your stitching just didn't quite catch the binding on the back side.

Origami Bags Sat. Dec. 19 1-4 \$20

These bags make great gift bags, just in time for Christmas. You can use them to hold your knitting, your English paper piecing, Nook readers-actually anything, because you can make them in any size. For the standard bag, all you need is 2 fat quarters, but bring more than 2 fats: you will want to make several bags, as they are so quick & easy.
