The Book Reading List needs to be examined, as we are fast approaching the end of the year: not many months and still a few books to go. #s 11, 13, and 37 are being particularly elusive. The song title book I may revisit. I had started Our House (which I miss-titled last week as Home Alone). Because Our House is the title of a song, I may go back and finish it, even though I don't like it. But I will hunt for a different one because the last thing I want to do is read something that's just not all that good.

What I do like about the reading list is that it makes me look for books I might not otherwise read: The President is Missing; The Island; Bitter Paradise; Malice; and There There Tommy Orange. I wouldn't have found them if I hadn't been looking. And if you don't know how to hunt for books in weird categories, all you have to do is run a search. Someone somewhere has already collected a list of books that fit all sorts of categories.

- So 2, 11, 13, and 37-39 I still have to find, decide and read. The rest (should be bold faced) are ones I have already read. The only ones I wouldn't recommend include #9's pick Supervolcano: Eruption; #12, Under Lock and Skeleton Key (just not that riveting); #13 Dashing through the Snow (a kind of inane romance worthy of Hallmark); #17 Beaches, Bungalows and Burglaries (it just didn't get any better no matter how much further along in the book I got); and #40 Stowaway (the ending of which should have been much much better).
- 2. A book you wish you could read for the first time, again South by Java Head by Alister McClean; 'Round the Bend by Neville Shute; Great Expectations by Charles Dickens; A Prayer for Owen Meany by John Irving there are many on the list. The Agony and the Ecstasy by Irving Stone
- 11. A book paired with a movie or tv show: same subject or idea, but not the same plot. Meaning, not a book adapted for a tv or movie. The Terror by Dan Simmons; Moon of the Crusted Snow by Waubgeshig Rice; Hide by Kiersten White; The Secrets We Kept by Lara Prescott
- 13. A book that has the same title as a song: Alone by Lisa Gardner; Here Comes the Sun by Nicole Y. Dennis-Benn; Dashing Through the Snow by Debbie Macomber; Our House
- 37. A book that takes place all in one day: The Long Walk by Stephen King; most of the Dan Brown books
- 38. An historical fiction book: Shrines of Gaiety by Kate Atkinson
- 39. A horror story set during winter: The Winter People by Jennifer McMahon; The Winter Ghosts by Kate Mosse

- 1. A book that's published in 2022: A Bride's Guide to Marriage and Murder by Dianne Freeman
- 3. A book that you really don't want to read: The President is Missing by Patterson & Clinton More fun than I anticipated. I liked it.
- 4. A book with a three word title: A Fatal Winter by G.M. Malliet; The Long Call by Ann Cleeves
- 5. A book whose title starts with a Q, X or Z: Zero Day by David Baldacci, it was okay
- 6. A book set somewhere you would like to visit in the next 3 years: Death by Water by Kerry Greenwood She writes the Phryne Fisher mysteries typically set in Australia. This one is on a cruise ship going to New Zealand. Always a fun read.
- 7. An historical murder mystery book, set prior to 1930: The Body in the Garden by Katharine Schellman. This is a series and I would like to read more.
- 8. A book translated into English: The Island by Ragmar Jonasson. Very good. And she has written more with the same (and other) detectives). It is set in Iceland. I would also like to go there.
- 9. A book about an alternate historical reality: The Man in the High Castle by Phillip K Dick; Supervolcano: Eruption by Harry Turtledove
- 10. A book about animals gone wild: Zoo by James Patterson, I saw the tv series and liked it a little better than the original story. Partly because the tv show had more depth.
- 12. A book about a locked room mystery: Under Lock & Skeleton Key by Gigi Pandia
- 13. A book that has the same title as a song: Dashing Through the Snow by Debbie Macomber
- 14. A book set in multiple countries: Frozen Assets by P.G. Wodehouse. Wodehouse is always amusing.
- 15. A book recommended by a blogger, vlogger, podcast or online book club: The Midnight Library by Matt Haig
- 16. A book with a knife on the cover: A Gathering of Shadows VE Schwab; Bitter Paradise by Ross Pennie (I am currently reading this one and I like it. It is a semi pandemic setting and the disease of the day is a form of polio. It is set currently in Canada).
- 17. A book with a green cover Beaches, Bungalows and Burglaries by Tonya Kappes [this book I did not like at all, so I may choose a different green cover book]; Frozen Assets by P.G. Wodehouse
- 18. A book you can read in one setting: Lincoln in the Bardo by George Sanders
- 19. A book with an upside down image on the cover: Gallant by VE Schwab
- 20. A book with only words on the cover: Me Talk Pretty Some Day by David Sedaris
- 21. A book that features two languages: The Madness of Crowds by Louise Penny. Excellent, as always
- 22. A book set in Japan: Malice by Keigo Higashino. Very Interesting, award winner, runner up I think, of the Edgar Allen Poe award
- 23. A banned book: Unwind by Neal Shusterman. Excellent and thought provoking for today's world. This is a Young Adult selection.
- 24. A book that takes place during your favorite holiday: A Fatal Winter by G.M. Malliet. A fun read. The minister/priest character helps solve mysteries and it is an ongoing series.
- 25. A book by Agatha Christie: Destination Unknown by Agatha Christie; Sparkling Cider
- 26. A book that's at least 100 years older than you are: The Moon &n Sixpence by William Somerset Maugham Not quite. This was written 100 years ago. I need a book written before 1855. Murders in the Rue Morgue by Poe
- A book with a protagonist with your profession: The Third Victim by Phillip Margolin
- 28. A book that takes place on an island: A Line to Kill by Anthony Horowitz (excellent, Horowitz is always a fun read. I suggest you start with A Murder of Crows, but you don't have to)
- 29. A book published in the year you were born: Destination Unknown by Agatha Christie; The Children of Green Knowe by L.M. Boston

- 30. A book whose author's initials are the same as yours: The Body by Bill Bryson. If you are not familiar with Bryson, he writes travel books, and he sometimes ventures into other kinds of journeys, like Home, The Body and A Short History of Nearly Everything.
- 31. A medical thriller: Genesis by Robin Cook [Cook is always good); Contagion by Robin Cook
- 32. A book borrowed from a Little Library: A Superior Death by Nevada Barr. If you haven't read any of the Nevada Barr books, she has a great protagonist who is a National Park Ranger. She gets posted to different parks in different books and there is always a murder.
- 33. A book that won the Anisfield-Wolf award: There There Tommy Orange [Weird to listen to, but enlightening. It took me awhile before I realized that all the characters were connected. Deals with Native American issues]
- 34. A book written by a first time author: Lessons in Chemistry, a charming, funny debut novel by Bonnie Garmus about Elizabeth Zott, a chemist in 1960s California who becomes the host of a cooking show and ends up teaching viewers about far more than how to bake a cake; The Poppy War Trilogy Set [The Poppy War; The Dragon Republic & The Burning God] [I am halfway through this series and it is excellent]
- 35. A book published in May: Sunset Beach by Mary Kay Andrews
- 36. A book about sports: Beartown by Fredrik Backman. As always her books are engaging and different. She wrote A Man Called Ove and Brit-Marie was Here
- 40. A book about a vacation: The Stowaway by James Murray and Darren Wearmouth,


Decoupage, a simple and stunning quilt done with lots of black and white.



Sew Spring: We will do this as a class, starting in April or May. It will be taught as a "block(s) of the month," over a several month period, going into summer.



Nolting Quilting Machines



#### **Nolting Longarm Machines**

Nolting has 5 main machines, each with different reaches: from 17" to 30" depending on the machine. They are sold with or without a frame, but after I saw & helped set up one of the steel frames this week, I recommend buying the frame. All machines, except for the Standard--the most economical machine-- have a stitch regulator. I recommend a stitch regulator. All machines can be equipped with a computer and there are a couple of different ones to choose from. In addition, you can get an extended table base so that you can use rulers, you can get larger bobbins on some of the models and on the frames you can get hydraulic lifts to raise and lower the tables. In the coming weeks, I will print out more information on each model.

The best entry level machine is the Fun Quilter. It comes in 17", 20" & 23" reach. It comes with the Intellistitch Equalizer stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.

The Pro Machine has the Intellistitch Turbo stitch regulator, single stitch option, standard speed control, needle up/down and customizable handles in the front & rear. The Pro Machine comes in 20", 24" and 30" reach with 10-12" of inside height. There are easy dials on the front to set stitch length and other options. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.

The NV Machine is the newest in the fleet of Nolting machines. This machine has a touch screen with progra mmable stitch regulation. You can stitch in 4 different stitch modes plus single stitch and needleup/down. It also has an adjustable brightness LED work light. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.
