This is one of the best ad campaigns I've seen in years. For Ruvio, a vacuum cleaner of sorts. It's so easy to use, you can just keep cleaning....longer. You betcha. That's certainly what I want to spend my time doing. Cleaning.

Now, in all fairness, a man is suggesting that. And no, before you jump to conclusions, he's not suggesting some woman in his life keep cleaning. He's all excited because he can keep cleaning. I dunno. Men often claim they don't know how women think. I think most women have no clue how men think. This guy? On the ad? I think he's deranged. In part because while this vacuum cleaning tool is powerful, presumably, and the battery life incredible – which is why you can just keep cleaning — it's also small. You have to keep cleaning and dumping and cleaning and dumping and cleaning … you get the picture … in order to get anything clean.

This ad heralds the sucky ad commercials we will now be subjected to because.....it's Christmas buying season. It's also Medicare renewal season. These ads have improved some, but Humana, and others, inundate the airways to the point that you know they're not hurting for money. But at least Joe Namath has switched from hawking Medicare advantage plans to hearing aids. That means we won't see him as

often, because the hearing aid industry probably doesn't make as much profit as the insurance companies. Not as much spare cash to blow on ads.

But that's not what I want to talk about. No, we need to talk about the movie Outbreak. Do you remember this movie? With Dustin Hoffman and an escaped monkey that was carrying a lethal virus? One of those movies we didn't revisit while quarantining during covid?

Well, it's back on various cable channels, and so are the monkeys. Well, they're not on tv. They've escaped from their research facility in South Carolina. 43 of them. Research monkeys. None of them have been captured. Everybody shudder all at once.

The research facility is called Alpha Genesis. And that's not creepy at all. "Residents are strongly advised to keep doors and windows secured to prevent these animals from entering homes," police said. "If you spot any of the escaped animals, please contact 911 immediately and refrain from approaching them." And that's not creepy, either.

So the monkeys got out because a caretaker didn't secure a door at the facility. "It's really like follow-the-leader. You see one go and the others go," Greg Westergaard, CEO of Alpha Genesis, told CBS News. "It was a group of 50 and 7 stayed behind and 43 bolted out the door."

Now these monkeys are pretty smart. The traps for them are baited, but the monkeys have figured out how to grab the food and jump back into the trees. You'd think Alpha Genesis could build a better monkey trap.

Alpha Genesis breeds the monkeys, in part, for clinical trials, like research on progressive brain disorders. And...these monkeys have escaped. And that's not creepy, either. Actually, local authorities said...Let me interrupt here. I've seen the

movies, like Outbreak and Planet of the Apes, and their local authorities who try to calm the public. So I find it interesting that "local authorities" are being quoted here. Anyway, the local authorities stated that the escaped monkeys are young females that aren't yet old enough for testing. Yeah. I believe that. Absolutely.

The CDC ... yes, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are involved ... have stated that the monkeys were living on Morgan Island, also known as Monkey Island or perhaps formerly known as Monkey Island, and were brought to Alpha Genesis for "conditioning to be around people." Well, that worked. The CDC also said that "the risk to the public is low as long as people do not approach or come in contact" with the monkeys. And...that's somehow not very comforting.

And neither is the fact that monkeys escaped from Alpha Genesis eight years ago and that it has had eight violations from the U.S. Department of Agriculture: monkeys placed in wrong cages, monkey died from trauma, other escapes from cages. But to be fair, in May 2024 the facility passed all inspections, and there are almost 7,000 monkeys at the facility. That's a lot to keep track of. But I bet they don't pass the next inspection.

So both the movie Outbreak and the remake of Planet of the Apes involved only one monkey...or at least only one monkey started the resulting crisis. Neither movie ends well for humanity, although in Outbreak the town is saved from being nuked at the last minute. This incident involves 43 monkeys. That's 10 times the power of 350. Or something like that.

But, probably, the most important take away from both movies are the reassuring "local authorities" who put a benign spin on the incident. That never turns out well in the movies.

Christmas Mystery 2024

Final Step

Assembly:

Print a copy of the pattern and assemble your squares on a flannel board—it will help if you can put up all of the squares so you can see how the various fabrics relate to each other. The quilt is 12 blocks wide and 13 long. Just put all the squares up, arrange to your liking, and sew together in rows.

Inner border: Cut at 2 ½" by length and width of quilt, app. 2 ½" X 78 ½" for sides and 2 ½" X 76 ½" for top & bottom . I suggest you cut 8 strips at 2 ½" X 42" and sew them together end to end. Then cut your borders from that strip. Because there are so many seams in this quilt, I would recommend measuring the quilt and cutting the borders to fit those measurements.

Outer border: Cut at 6  $\frac{1}{2}$ " by length and width of quilt. I encourage you to cut these borders straight of grain. I am using a border stripe, so my width will be adjusted according to where I cut the border stripe.

My quilt is on the flannel boards at the shop. I think I have everything where I want it. Come take a look.

#### **November Classes**

#### Bison Wall Hanging Parts I & II, Nov 2, 1-5 and Nov 9, 1-5 \$35 Barb Boyer

The Bison Wall Hanging comes from Wyoming pattern designer Sewn Design. The head of the bison is made in a crazy quilt style or from left over bits from your stash. The rest of the bison is created from one piece of fabric. The two pieces are then fused into place on a background. I'll show you how to "window pane" the bison, to reduce the amount of fusible needed for the quilt. Then the bison is secured using a machine blanket stitch—or any other decorative stitch. Part I is making the head and Part II is fusing in down and appliqueing in place.

### Let's Strip! Quilts Sat Nov 16 10:30-4 or 5 Jean Korber and Barb Boyer \$130

March's quilt is Tulip Patch. You will need 25 assorted green strips for stems and 25 assorted strips for the tulips, plus background (and borders, if you want them). This quilt teaches different ways to use the 45 degree flip method for making flying geese-styled blocks.

#### Krista Moser Christmas Tree Skirt Sat Nov 23 10:30-4 \$45 Jean Korber

Krista has done it again with a great eloquent tree skirt. We love Krista Moser patterns because they go together so well and look like they are so complicated: Not. We also like offering her classes because the quilts use a 60 degree diamond ruler and we like to get as much use out of our specialty rulers that we can!
