Final Step

Assembly:

Print a copy of the pattern and assemble your squares on a flannel board—it will help if you can put up all of the squares so you can see how the various fabrics relate to each other. The quilt is 12 blocks wide and 13 long. Just put all the squares up, arrange to your liking, and sew together in rows.

Inner border: Cut at  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " by length and width of quilt, app.  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " X  $78\frac{1}{2}$ " for sides and  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " X  $76\frac{1}{2}$ " for top & bottom . I suggest you cut 8 strips at  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " X 42" and sew them together end to end. Then cut your borders from that strip. Because there are so many seams in this quilt, I would recommend measuring the quilt and cutting the borders to fit those measurements.

Outer border: Cut at 6 ½" by length and width of quilt. I encourage you to cut these borders straight of grain. I am using a border stripe, so my width will be adjusted according to where I cut the border stripe.

My quilt is on the flannel boards at the shop. I think I have everything where I want it. Come take a look.
