It's time to trot out the book list. We have about 4 months to go. I have 5 books left on the list and am almost through one of them. I have underlined the books that I have read, so you will know which ones I'm counting. I have listed other titles for some of the categories to give you options if you are struggling to find the right read. This year's list has been a little surprising to me. Some of the books I have read, I didn't really like. Others, I read everything the writer has written, like the Finlay Donavan books. A few, I barely remember, which probably says more about my memory than the value of the book.

So first, my favorites: I liked all of the Finlay Donavan books. They are fun reads, improbable plots, which make them even better.

My Mechanical Romance was better than anticipated. It involves teens who build robots for competitions. This really happens, and I suspect that the detail involved designing the robots, "training" them (which means training the humans to make them work), and finally competing with them was accurate. And then I ran into a grandmother at the store who was attending one of these competitions to watch her grand kid, and from what she described, the book nailed it.

Animal Farm was a particularly good read, especially as an older and, I hope, wiser adult. It was well worth revisiting.

The Ink Black Heart by Robert Galbraith, a.k.a. JK Rowlings, was a long listen. So much of the book occurs in messaging, either through gaming platforms, phones or emails. Which means all of the headers get read, just like the phone app in the car that reads all sorts of details on text message before getting to the message. That was tedious. But I decided that eventually the detectives would figure out the important things within those texts and talk about them to each other, thus eliminating the need for me to play Miss Marple and try to figure out who dun it through the clues dropped by the author in those texts. While I have my issues with Rowlings, the detail she includes in her books makes me feel like I am living in the moment with her characters.

Anything Dorothy Sayers does is good. Margaret Mizushima's series is also good, easy to read.

The Wool, Shift and Dust dystopian series by Hugh Howey was reasonably predictable. A younger reader would find the issues presented more novel, but I was intrigued enough to get through the trilogy.

Central Park West by James Comey was surprisingly good. I didn't expect it. Everyone in my Family has Killed Someone Benjamin Stevenson was hilarious. And on this one, you could play Miss Marple & try to figure it out. He drops enough clues. He even tells you he's doing that.

Turtles all the Way Down by John Green is probably the best read of the year. It's a coming of age story, a little autobiographical, and shows the difficulties faced by teens who have to maneuver through, and maybe around, mental health issues. The story was compelling: It was fascinating, educational and encouraging.

One of Us is Lying by Karen McManus demonstrates how we all keep secrets, which is a gentle way of saying, we all lie. At least about some things. The story is told from the perspectives of all the teens involved in a death of a classmate.

Leigh Bardugo never fails and her Six of Crows was excellent. And while I generally don't like memoir kind of books, Is Everyone Hanging Out Without Me by Mindy Kailing was funny and interesting.

Books I don't remember: Full House by Janet Evanovich; The Secrets of Wishtide by Kate Saunders; What's the Matter with Mary Jane by Candas Jane Dorsey; and The Death of Kings by Rennie Airth. But that doesn't mean I didn't like them.

I didn't like Mary Poppins, for all the reasons I stated a couple of weeks ago. I also didn't like <u>The Night Circus</u> by <u>Erin Morgenstern</u> (sorry Mel). It's a magical realism kind of story, and while I like sci fi and fantasy, and most of Barbara Kingsolver's novels, I don't find magical realism all that intriguing.

I also didn't like A Court of Thorns and Roses by Sarah Maas, although I typically like fantasy books, and hers are routinely touted as being some of the best. As I told my niece, I'd rather have more story and less panting. It's a teen book, so when it gets to those parts, it's mostly panting and nothing else. The unfortunate part is that the young woman who is being held captive and who is the protagonist, takes as her due the abuse inflicted upon her, because, of course, she is in love with her captor. Save me.

Nine Patch Challenge

July 1-October 5



The summer scrap bag challenge is to make a quilt using the classic 9patch block. Each bag purchased gets you one quilt. Each quilt finished from one bag gets you one entry for a \$100 gift certificate. For purposes of this challenge, a 9-patch block can be any block that consists of 9 squares of a uniform size. So long as the block is based upon a grid that is 3 X 3, the individual squares can be a regular square, a half square triangle or a quarter square triangle unit. So blocks like the Ohio Star, traditional 9-patch, or Churn Dash are acceptable. You can add alternate blocks, like a plain block or a snowball block, in between your 9-patch blocks. You can separate your blocks with sashing. Or just piece your blocks together, so long as the result is clearly a nine-patch block quilt. Your quilt needs to be, at a minimum, 60" X 60" (Sorry I couldn't get the block images loaded better)

If you want to learn to hand embroider or just brush up your technique, join us on the second Saturday of the month from 10 to noon. You can work on your own projects or you can join the project we are doing, which are sheep! From Crabapple Hill

Knit Pickers' Club 2nd and 4th Wed of each month, 2-5 Carol Moler

Come join our Knit Pickers= Club. We knit 2 days a month every second and fourth Wednesday, from 2-5. The Club is open to all skill levels and, despite the name, includes crocheters as well. We want to share what we've learned, find new patterns, and simply just sit and knit. We may work on some felting projects, fingerless mittens, mittens, and socks. September classes

Cozy Flannel Quilt, lap size or queen size Sat Sept 7 1-4 \$30 Barb Boyer Max. 5 students

This quilt can be made in two sizes. The patterns, and our samples, are 48" X 48". But you can make 4 units and sew them together for a 96" X 96". Or add borders to make the lap size into a twin or double. The quilt uses 5 different flannels and we have great choices. The class is limited because we only have 5 patterns.

Beginning Quilting 8 weeks \$65 Barb Boyer Starting Sun Sept 8

This comprehensive 8-week course will introduce to you almost everything you need to know about piecing a quilt top. Along the way you will learn about color, batting, thread, machines and various techniques to give you the skills to make almost any quilt.

One Block Wonder Parts I and 2 Sat Sept 14 1-4 and Oct 19 10:30-5 \$45 Jean Korber

If you haven't tried making a one block wonder quilt from panels, you are missing out on a spectacular quilt. This quilt uses 7 panels; 6 are cut into triangles and the remaining panel is incorporated intact into the quilt. You will learn how to accurately stack your 6 panels, cut them apart into strips, which are then cut into 6 identical triangles. After piecing your half hexagon units, you will design your own quilt. Jean has great tips and suggestions on how to make this quilt, how to incorporate additional fabrics into your quilt, and how to evaluate what panels make the best One Block Wonder quilts.

Let's Strip! Quilts Sat Sept 21 and Nov 16 10:30-4 or 5 Jean Korber and Barb Boyer \$130

6 quilts, 1 book, every other month, 1 price for all 6 classes. (or \$35/class if you pick & choose). We did this last year, using one book and fat quarters, and the quilts were amazing. So we're trying it again, this time using 2 ½" strips. Each class will employ different techniques, and we sometimes change things up a little. We want you to learn something new in each class. The book is Striking Strip Quilts by Kate Henderson. You'll have to find the book on line, as it is no longer being published. If you have trouble finding it, let me know. January's quilt is called Summer Holiday; March is Tulip Patch; May is Day Dream; July is Twinkle Twinkle; September is By the Sea Shore; and November is Heading Home (which uses a lot of flying geese so if you want a jump start on the quilt, come to the Let's Make flying Geese class on Jan 15).

Travel Tote Bag September 28 10:30-4 and Oct 26 10:30-4 \$50 Jean Korber

This is a bag you can slip over the handles of your roll along luggage. Perfect for traveling, perfect for traveling to class with your sewing machine on a roll along cart. The class has 2 parts: first preparing your fabric and figuring out the pattern—Jean will tell you what parts need to be constructed before you put the bag together. The second class will be assembling the bag, adding pockets, learning to put in zippers. She's also made a few modifications, of course, and she'll explain how to do all of that.

October Classes

Lost Socks Sat Oct 5, 1-5 \$35 Barb Boyer

We all have a lost sock or two. This quilt celebrates all of the lost socks that no longer have a match. There are big socks and small socks and they are machines appliqued onto various backgrounds. You can make the quilt out of flannels, brushed cottons, wovens or regular fabrics. Make each sock unique and use all different applique stitches to secure them.

Jingle Pops Christmas Tree Sat Oct 12 1:00-4 \$35 Barb Boyer

The Jingle Pops are Hoffman fabrics famous 2 ½" strip sets, done in golds or silvers. Or you can use your own strip set to make this delightful Christmas Tree quilt. Easy to do and done before Christmas.

One Block Wonder Parts I and 2 Sat Sept 14 1-4 and Oct 19 10:30-5 \$45 Jean Korber ongoing

Travel Tote Bag September 28 10:30-4 and Oct 26 10:30-4 \$50 Jean Korber ongoing

November Classes

Bison Wall Hanging Parts I & II, Nov 2, 1-5 and Nov 9, 1-5 \$35 Barb Boyer

The Bison Wall Hanging comes from Wyoming pattern designer Sewn Design. The head of the bison is made in a crazy quilt style or from left over bits from your stash. The rest of the bison is created from one piece of fabric. The two pieces are then fused into place on a background. I'll show you how to "window pane" the bison, to reduce the amount of fusible needed for the quilt. Then the bison is secured using a machine blanket stitch—or any other decorative stitch. Part I is making the head and Part II is fusing in down and appliqueing in place.

Let's Strip! Quilts Sat Nov 16 10:30-4 or 5 Jean Korber and Barb Boyer \$130

March's quilt is Tulip Patch. You will need 25 assorted green strips for stems and 25 assorted strips for the tulips, plus background (and borders, if you want them). This quilt teaches different ways to use the 45 degree flip method for making flying geese-styled blocks.

Krista Moser Christmas Tree Skirt Sat Nov 23 10:30-4 \$45 Jean Korber

Krista has done it again with a great eloquent tree skirt. We love Krista Moser patterns because they go together so well and look like they are so complicated: Not. We also like offering her classes because the quilts use a 60 degree diamond ruler and we like to get as much use out of our specialty rulers that we can!

December Classes

Machine Binding with your BSR Sat December 7, 1-4 \$45 Jean Korber

Do you have a Bernina and you have the BSR (stitch regulator) and don't know how to use it? This class is for you. Jean will show you the ins and outs of machine quilting on your Bernina with the BSR. This is hands on class. You will need a small project (10" to 40", table runner, small wall nagging, place mat, etc) that is ready to be quilted. When you sign up, we will tell you how to prepare your project so you are ready to quilt in class.

Storm at Sea Sat December 14 1-4 and 21 10:30-4 \$35 Barb Boyer

This quilt used to be intimidating—then a ruler was developed and now it's a breeze! We will work with Deb Tucker's ruler for the construction of the block. We will also talk about various color schemes, one of which includes coloring the blocks to make a heart appear within the design.
